In this endeavor, the institution initiated the process of recruiting and documenting the -

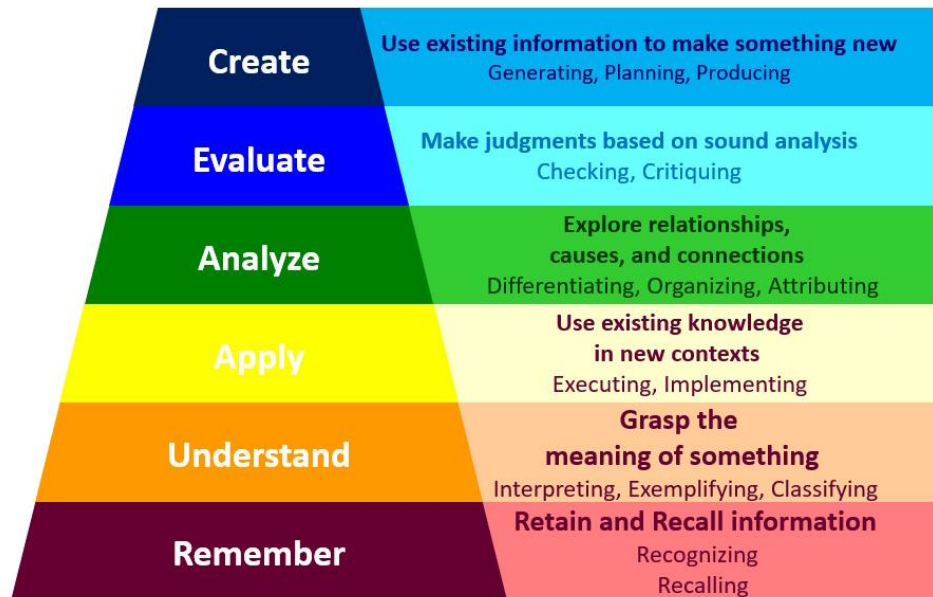

The original Bloom's Taxonomy was created in 1956 to represent the hierarchical degrees of learning in the cognitive realm. The initial iteration of Bloom's taxonomy of Cognitive learning outcomes consisted of six stages. In 2001, Bloom's taxonomy of Cognitive Learning Outcomes underwent a revision that involved reorganizing the hierarchies of the learning outcomes. The educators at Government General Degree College, Mohanpur, ensure that students achieve the highest learning outcomes, starting from the foundational layers and progressing to the pyramid's pinnacle.

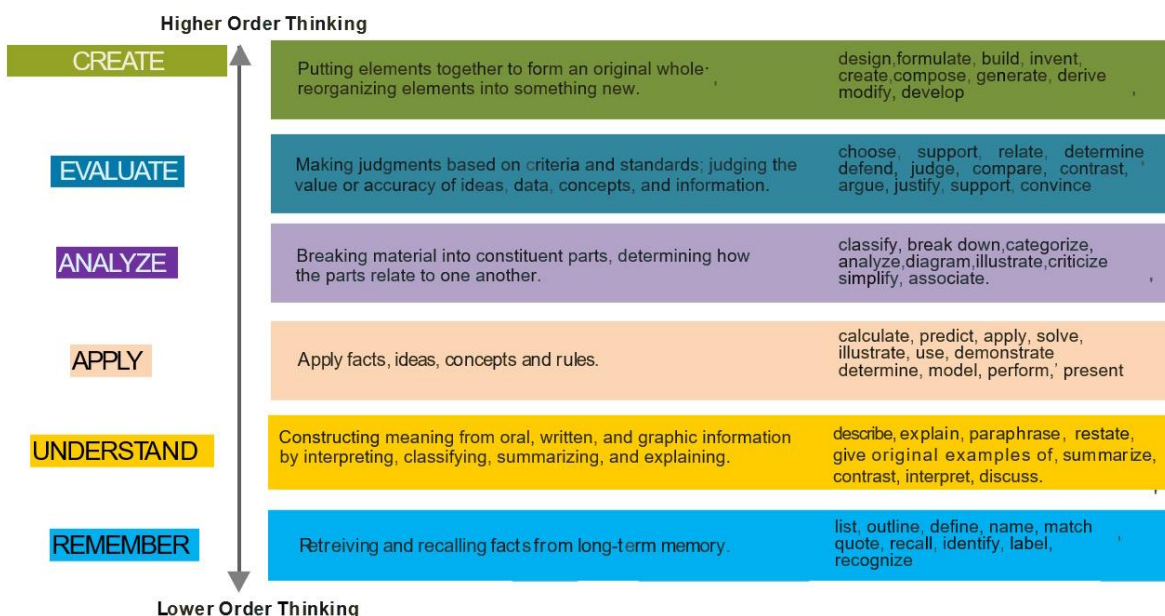

Bloom's taxonomy of cognitive domain learning outcomes can be more effectively depicted using the following globally recognized diagrams:

- Students are taught sociology to better understand our society and culture's structures.

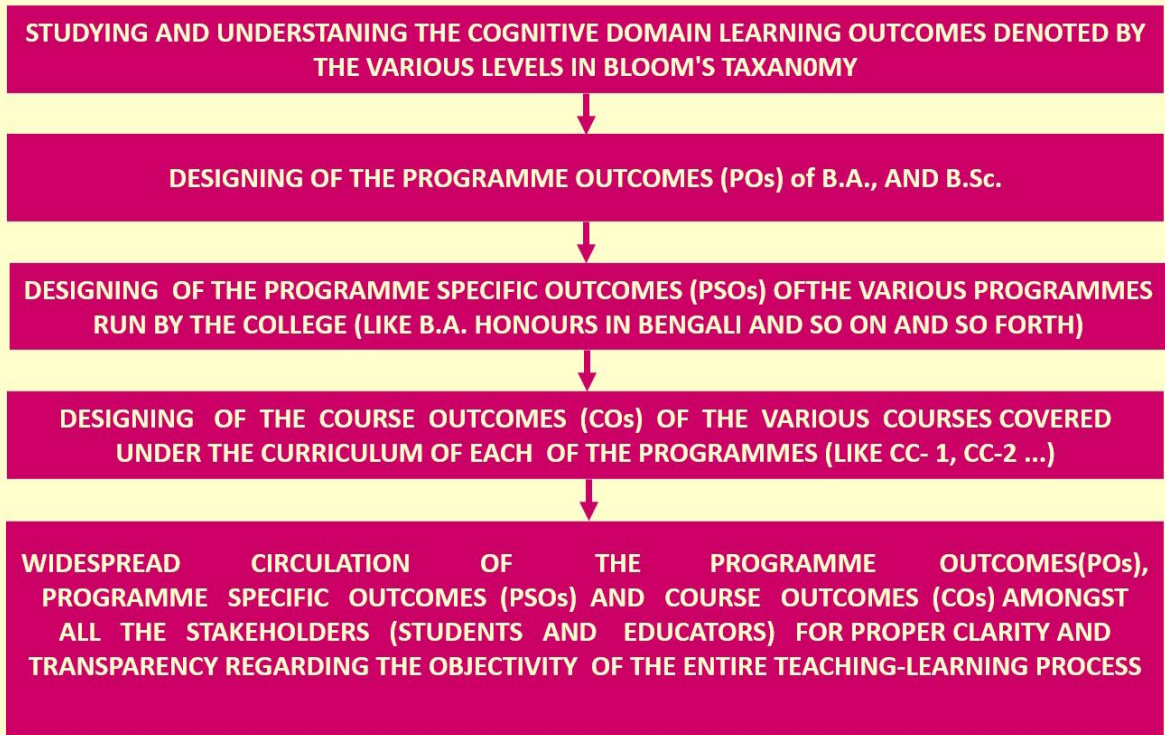
2. Program Outcomes of B.Sc. (General)

Zoology studies all animal life, from primitive microscopic malaria-causing protozoa to large advanced mammals, across all environmental spheres, from red deer in mountain forests to dolphins in deep oceans and underground burrowing voles to golden eagles in the skies. Some of these animals are useful to us, and we nurture them as pets or livestock; some are serious pests or disease-causing, and some are simply splendid and awe-inspiring. No matter our relationship with animals, we need to understand their behaviour, population dynamics, physiology, and how they interact with other species and their environments.
